VOCABULARY

Muse: a person or personified force who is the source of inspiration for a creative artist. For example: Maud Gonne was William Butler Yeats' muse.

Life-Size: of the same size as the person or thing represented. For example: The team used a life-size model of a shark to try develop a new boat design.

Stony-Faced: having an impassive, unfriendly and unyielding expression. For example: A stony-faced woman answered the door.

Elusive: something or someone that is difficult to find, describe, remember, or achieve. For example: Late in the night, taxis are elusive and expensive!

Veracity: (in this context) precision; accuracy. For example: The veracity of his claims could not be determined.

Mangled: an object which is crushed or twisted very forcefully, so that it is difficult to see what its original shape was. For example: By the time the boys finished fighting, only mangled remains were left of the toy train set!

Wake: (in this context) the path or course of anything that has passed or preceded. For example: The dog left a mess in his wake as he was chasing the cat!
