VOCABULARY

Intertwine: connect or link (two or more things) closely. For example: As with most traditions, fact and fiction have become intertwined so much, it's become difficult to sieve through what's genuine and otherwise.

Utopia: an imagined place or state of things in which everything is perfect. For example: Most people confuse utopia with reality, leading to disillusionment and conflict.

Miserly Scrooge: a mean-spirited miserly person. For example: Our neighbour is grumpy and a miserly scrooge!
