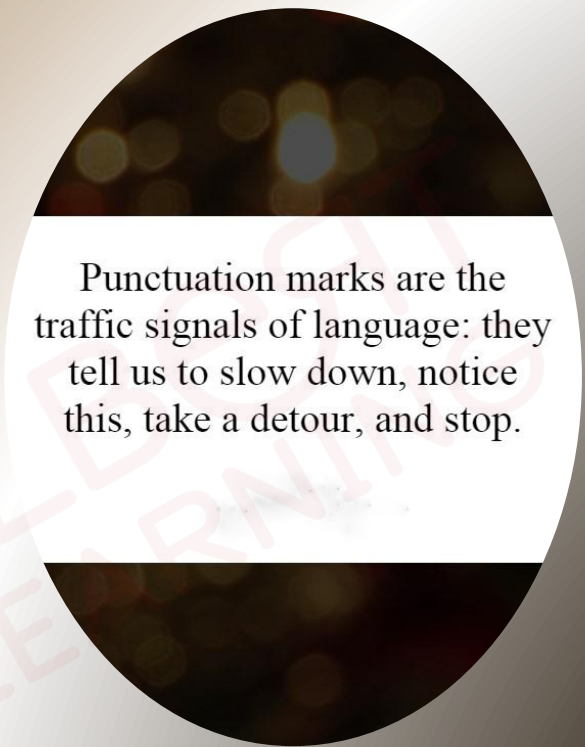




Punctuation marks are the traffic signals of language: they tell us to slow down, notice this, take a detour, and stop.
