

Imperative sentences



What is an imperative sentence.

Imperative sentences are used to issue a command or instruction, make a request, or offer advice. Basically, they tell people what to do. Imperative sentences usually end with a period but can occasionally end with an exclamation point. These sentences are sometimes referred to as directives because they provide direction to whomever is being addressed.

When do we use Imperative?

We can use the imperative to give a direct order.

- Take that chewing gum out of your mouth.
- Stand up straight.
- Give me the details.

We can use the imperative to give instructions.

- Open your book.
- Take two tablets every evening.
- Take a left and then a right.

We can use the imperative to make an invitation.

- Come in and sit down. Make yourself at home.
- Please start without me. I'll be there shortly.
- Have a piece of this cake. It's delicious.
