



Am, Is and Are

The auxiliaries <u>am, is and are</u> are used in the simple present tense to show the connection between the subject and a noun or adjective that comes after it.

• I **am** a doctor.

He **is** Canadian.

• Sam and John **are** engineers.



Am

Am is the first person singular of the present tense of *be*. *Am* is often shortened to *'m* in spoken English. It is used when a person talks about himself/herself. The negative forms are *I am not* and *I'm not*.

I am / I'm a big fan of American movies. (Positive)

Am I a good player? (Interrogative)



• I am not / I'm not tired today. (Negative)
