Yard: an area of land in which a particular type of work is done, often one from which goods are sold.

Evacuation: the process of moving people from a dangerous place to somewhere safe.

Vessel: a large boat or a ship.

Salvage: to save goods from damage or destruction, especially from a ship that has sunk or been damaged or a building that has been damaged by fire or a flood.

Sentence (in this context): a punishment given by a judge in court to a person or organization after they have been found guilty of doing something wrong.

Shipwreck: an accident in which a ship is destroyed or sunk at sea, especially by hitting rocks, or a ship that has been destroyed or sunk in such an accident.

Guilty: the person who has done something wrong or who has committed a crime.

Fatality: a death caused by an accident or by violence, or someone who has died in either of these ways.

Hope: to want something to happen or to be true, and usually have a good reason to think that it might.

Concordia class: The Concordia class is a class of cruise ships that are operated by Costa Cruises and Carnival Cruise Lines, subsidiaries of Carnival Corporation & Plc.

Thalassotherapy: the use of seawater in cosmetic and health treatment.
