Vocabulary

Redundant: Not or no longer needed or useful; superfluous. For example: Phone booths have become redundant.

Prejudice: Preconceived opinion that is not based on reason or actual experience. For example: Society's bane is prejudice.

Taciturn: (Of a person) reserved or uncommunicative in speech; saying little. For example: Tony was taciturn throughout the evening.

Unaffected: Without artificiality or insincerity. For example: Her unaffected laughter is contagious. OR Feeling or showing no effects or changes.

Panoramic: (In this context) (of a view or picture) with a wide view surrounding the observer; sweeping. For example: The bedroom had a panoramic view of the mountains.

Throes: Intense or violent pain and struggle, especially accompanying birth, death, or great change. For example: Danny behaves badly when he is in throes of jealousy.
